GRANT UPDATE by Steve Riley

After a thorough review of the options available to the Association to manage both grant applications and administration going forward, the NLA Board has decided to enter into a comprehensive agreement with the Sigurd Olson Environmental Institute at Northland College in Ashland. The institute will review engineering and consultant reports that have been funded in the past as well as information on the Namakagon Chain of Lakes that is in various governmental data bases prior to recommending a path going forward for NLA and our Townships.

Grant administration has been a challenge for the Board due to rather comprehensive requirements stipulated by WDNR associated with the grants. These include maintaining and posting landing monitor logs, conducting educational training on AIS, publishing literature on AIS, composing summation documents on what the grants accomplished, maintaining financial records and receipts on all relevant expenditures among other requirements. To date we, along with our environmental engineers, have accomplished a comprehensive aquatic plant and sanitary survey, applied for and received funding for two additional landing monitors systems (ILID'S) and developed a lake management plan. We have subsequently determined that the sanitary survey as conducted by our engineering consultants was inadequate and consequently we will again address that issue going forward. Basically we have been advised that using a "sniffer" to detect methane gas as opposed to taking and analyzing lake water samples is not a reliable method of determining if there are septic system related issues in our chain of lakes.

Your NLA Board has directed Steve Riley to be the primary contact with the Sigurd Olson Environmental Institute and NLA

DUES AND VOTING ELIGIBILITY

At the recent meeting, it became clear that there may be some confusion regarding the cycle of dues for the NLA. Dues cover the calendar year from January 1 through December 31 each year. To be eligible to vote, dues must be postmarked by June 1 of each year.

Board Member Julia Campbell will be the primary contact person with that same organization to coordinate the landing monitor program. As the Association's primary grant writer, Steve will also be the primary contact with WDNR.

Finally, in order to reduce costs and gain efficiency going forward with our monitoring and aquatic sampling programs, NLA will coordinate our efforts with The Lake Owen Association as they will be utilizing many of the same monitors from Northland to accomplish the same tasks on Lake Owen. In closing, please join me in thanking Lisa Holt, Tim Browne, Julia Campbell, Linda Fischer and especially Dr. Denise Dupras for their considerable time and effort in accomplishing the aforementioned tasks.

PUBLIC NOTICE OF MEETING

Last summer, the Town of Namakagon found out from concerned landowners along the river that the area from the Birch Lane Bridge to the Namakagon Dam at Dam Road is not covered under normal Wisconsin Boating rules as it is considered a river and not part of the lake. Since many Wisconsin boating rules refer only to "lake" in the rule book the rules applying to slow-no-wake are not enforceable on rivers. The Town of Namakagon has requested that the Wisconsin DNR give permission to the town to pass an ordinance for a slow-no-wake zone from the Birch Lane bridge to the Namakagon Dam. Our reasoning for this request was the narrowness of the river, the shallow rock laden bottom, the residences with docks, and that the area is an environmentally sensitive area. On November 19, 2010 the DNR did give their approval of this slow-no-wake zone. As part of this process the Town of Namakagon must have a public hearing after a 60 day waiting period from the date of approval. The Town of Namakagon will be having a public hearing Tuesday February 8, 2011 at 7:30 in the Namakagon Town Hall. Please come and give your input on this ordinance.

FISHSTICKS!

An Innovative, Voluntary Habitat Enhancement Initiative for Lakeshore Owners

In 2007, property owners on Bony Lake in southwest Bayfield County, in partnership with the Bayfield County Land and Water Conservation Department and the DNR, began a whole lake restoration project to move the shoreline on their lake toward a more natural appearance with a functioning near-shore eco-system. An innovative part of this project was the installation of large diameter wood (whole trees and branches) to the restored or natural shorelines of interested landowners. In 2008, the Eau Claire Lakes Conservation Club provided volunteers and financial assistance to advance the installation of woody habitat to the Eau Claire Lakes Chain.

The number of landowners participating is growing steadily as is the number of lakes benefiting from the habitat work. Developing a process for landowners to easily install woody habitat complexes along their shorelines as part of the restoration projects was the beginning of a revolutionary approach to shoreline restoration. **There is both financial and technical assistance available to landowners interested in completing a wood complex on their shorelines.** The "Fish Sticks Project", as it is now known, has helped landowners install more than 600 trees to their shorelines on four lakes. Bony Lake has increased the number of habitat trees available in the lake from 89 to nearly 500. The Upper and Middle Eau Claire Lakes have added almost 150 trees, while Wilipyro Lake has installed 106.

Trees are selected for use according to sound forest management guidelines and are not taken if considered to be likely future recruitment trees. Trees may come from the landowners' properties or from donor parcels near by. Installation is done from the ice so there is very little ground disturbance of the uplands. The trees are attached to the shoreline by steel rods or cables so they stay in place while they "settle in" for the next couple of hundred years. As the ecologic importance of wood is better understood by lake property owners, interest in the installation of Fish Sticks continues to increase. **The addition of wood to the littoral zone or near shore area of a lake is the next best conservation practice after the establishment of a native vegetation plant community along the shoreline.**

Why is Wood Good?

The natural condition of a lake shore in Wisconsin is either a wooded forest or a wetland edge. After the glaciers receded 10,000 years ago, the newly formed lake shores were colonized by the adapting vegetation which climaxed in forests of mixed hardwoods and conifers. These forested lakeshores continue to provide essential complex habitat through the perpetual process of shoreline trees falling into the water. This continuous recruitment of trees creates a wood-based physical structure in the littoral zone that is common on all pristine water bodies. The insects, fish, amphibians, birds, and other animals have also evolved with this abundance of near shore wood and it is essential to their life cycles.

Wood in the near-shore areas of lakes continues to play a crucial role in the ecosystem. The forest-lake interface creates edge habitat on the

shoreline. This forest-lake edge habitat, like all edge habitats, contains richer species diversity and higher concentrations of species than the adjoining habitats themselves will have. Research has shown that a single white pine tree along the waterline could have as many as 27 separate species rooted on it. Aquatic animal life colonizes the woody structure throughout its lifetime, which can be as much as 300 years or more, and the structure protects the shoreline from wave erosion. These physically complex lakeshore habitats are far superior to the shorelines typically found today on well developed lakes.

Food

The abundance of wood in the near shore areas creates a super market for the animals in the lake. The bottom of a single white pine log lying on the shoreline could house a density of up to 75,000 invertebrates. While the invertebrates dine on the white pine, small fish gather to feast on them, and larger fish find the abundance of smaller fish to their liking. Research has proven that panfish in lakes with significant complex woody habitat have growth rates up to three times that of fish in more simple habitats due to the increased availability of invertebrates. Studies have also shown that not only are there more fish along woody shorelines, but they feed in these areas at rates seven times higher than along shorelines void of wood. Waterfowl and shore birds utilize the high protein diet of invertebrates and small fish that frequent these woody complexes.

Cover

Wood complexes provide essential cover that allows fish and other animals to successfully complete their life cycles. Healthy populations of all living things must have the opportunity to be born, live and successfully procreate. The nooks and crannies of wood complexes offer critters safety from predators while at the same time concentrating prey to make predators more efficient. Wood provides the structure on which many species must lay or attach their eggs. More quality spawning and nesting habitat produces more young; more young provide more prey and the cycle continues in balance.

Shoreline Protection

Wood complexes can protect shorelines from wind and wave erosion. The forty to fifty foot long trees commonly used to construct wood complexes calm the waters by absorbing the energy of both wind and powerboat generated waves. Without wood, waves can crash full force against the shoreline, eroding and undermining the shoreline vegetation. When the vegetation drops or slumps, it creates an area of raw soil that will reach the lake through runoff or wind. Powerful waves also prevent the establishment of native aquatic plant communities along the shoreline because of the scouring effect that takes place in the moving sand. Reducing wave energy allows detritus material floating or suspended in the water to drop out and accumulate in the shelter of the wood. This material is the "top soil" of the lake allowing native aquatic vegetation to take root, providing additional habitat and reducing areas available for potential colonization by invasive species.

How Much Wood Is Enough?

On undeveloped lakes, the density of natural woody complexes often exceeds 1,100 pieces per mile; or one every five feet. On Bony Lake, the original density of wood was 36 pieces per mile, and has been increased to 179 pieces per mile through landowner efforts. This five-fold increase is still only 20% of the density found on the undeveloped lakes. **There is a tremendous opportunity for riparian landowners to improve the quality of their lakes through the addition of more wood to their shorelines.**

JULY 10, 2010

The meeting was called to order at 9:04 by President Phil Rasmussen.

Minutes of June 19, 2010 Meeting

Reviewed by Board and membership in attendance. Corrections were made. A motion to approve was made by Tim Browne and seconded by Tom Nelson. The minutes were approved.

Treasurer's Report:

Submitted by Tim Browne. The General Accounting balance as of 7/19/2010 was reported as 30,507.94 and corrected to 34,867.59. A motion to approve was made by Denise Dupras and seconded by Linda Fischer. The report was approved.

Landing Monitor Update:

Julia Campbell introduced Mike Gardner, Program Manager at Sigurd Olson Environmental Institute. He updated the Board and membership on the role and activities of the Institute and the opportunity to employ students from Northland College through a Memorandum of Understanding in conjunction with the Environmental Sentry Protection, LLC organization to monitor landings on Lake Namekagon. The two students, Kira Hefty and Sascha Yates were in attendance and will begin monitoring at Hwy D landing and Funnys Bay. The tentative plan for the monitoring will include coverage on Friday night, Saturday, Sunday and holidays. Julia Campbell indicated that we have 80 hours logged and have met our volunteer time requirement. She thanked the members for their time in this activity. Linda Fischer and Julia Campbell were thanked for their time and efforts in organizing and coordinating this and the landing monitors. Julia Campbell indicated that Jim Krueger has donated sleeping accommodations for the monitors when they are here during the weekends. The Board and membership recognized and thanked Jim Krueger for this.

Fun on the Water:

Linda Fischer provided an update on the planning for the event. She is coordinating with Al Stawicki. She and Al Stawicki are going to buy prizes. She brought a picture of the new updated shirt. The membership was very supportive of the sponsorship of the event and thanked Linda Fischer for all of her efforts in soliciting donations. The newsletter has been sent out and will contain a registration form for the event.

Board Candidates:

Denise Dupras indicated that she would run for the board again, but no other candidates have come forward. Many individuals have been asked. The procedure for the election will be the same as last year. August 1 will be the deadline for submission of names for the ballot.

A write-in space will be provided. If a candidate is identified at the meeting, he or she will still need to be supported by a quorum of members. If there are not enough members at the annual meeting, a mailed ballot will be sent to all members for vote.

Barnes Overlay:

Jim Krueger, an NLA member and member of the Town Comprehensive planning group discussed the Barnes Overlay. There has been approval for the Town Board to evaluate the Barnes Overlay, but it has not been adopted by the Town of Namakagon. Jim Krueger presented schematics to explain our current zoning and indicated that "key holing" which is on Missionary Point, is no longer possible. He indicated that the Town is looking not only at Lake Namekagon, but at all of the surrounding lakes and other navigable waters (including streams and rivers) that would be impacted by the Overlay. Currently on Lake Namekagon, there are no imminent dangers that require adoption of the Overlay. He also indicated that there are ongoing issues with exceptions where the promised mitigation has not occurred, which are a concern for many as there has not been an effective means of enforcing mitigation. Bob Parsonage who is on the BCLF Board indicated that their organization is looking at this from a county perspective, with a goal of providing for responsible development of the lakes. Mike Gardner is also on the BCLF and indicated that there are a number of complexities with the Overlay. When asked, Bob Parsonage indicated that he was in favor of the Overlay. Jim Krueger indicated that the Overlay would have to be modified before it would meet the needs of the Town of Namakagon and that there is ongoing investigation and consideration of the needs of all who would be impacted by the Overlay. He asked the membership to provide input to the Town on this important issue. The NLA as an organization has not been asked to take a position on this issue. It was suggested that this topic be discussed at the upcoming Annual Meeting as well.

New Business:

Program for the Annual Meeting: Mike Gardner was invited and tentatively accepted to make a presentation on behalf of the Sigurd Olson Environmental Institute. We will also invite a presentation on the status of the Common Loon and concerns regarding the impact of the oil spill in the Gulf.

Fish Sticks Project: Bob Parsonage, member of the Bayfield County Lakes Forum briefly discussed the "Fish Sticks Project" and its importance as a means of improving the fisheries and shoreline restoration. More information can be found in the recent Bayfield County Lakes Reflection newsletter. (www.BayfieldCountyLakes.org) He encouraged the membership to provide input and comments on this activity.

Minutes of July 10, 2010 Meeting

Reviewed by Board and membership in attendance. A motion to approve was made by Lisa Holt and seconded by Linda Fischer. The minutes were approved.

Treasurer's Report:

Submitted by Tim Browne. The General Accounting balance as of 9/17/2010 was reported as 22,251.55. A motion to approve was made by Denise Dupras and seconded by Steve Riley. The report was approved.

Grant Update:

Denise Dupras shared the letter she received from FOTH in response to the request to itemize the additional charges for completion of the survey. In the letter they outlined a general breakdown of the \$2500 additional charge for the 2nd scientist and the questionnaire expenses. The Board and membership discussed the letter and also the information from the WDNR on residual funding available to the NLA for grants LPL-1234-08 & LPL-1235-08, \$2,500 & \$1867.03 respectively.

After discussion, Denise Dupras made a motion "Denise Dupras will contact Mr. Brian Hinrichs at FOTH, with the following offer – the NLA will agree to pay FOTH \$4367.03, equal to the amount of the funds available from the WDNR for the two grants, in payment for the completion of acceptable deliverables, to include the sanitary survey, sociologic landowners survey, and APM plan to the WDNR. If the offer is declined, president Phil Rasmussen is authorized to contact and retain an attorney to notify FOTH of breach of contract." The motion was seconded and approved.

ILIDs:

The Garden Lake camera is not currently functional because The Landing has discontinued its internet service. Steve Riley has been in contact with Eric Lindberg and will contact him to determine where the router is and how we can get the camera up and functional before the Muskie Tournament. The NLA will likely need to fund the internet service next year. Other options will also be investigated.

Eric Lindberg has provided a generic log-on for reviewing the recordings. Denise Dupras will contact the volunteers to coordinate the review of landing tapes.

The Board reviewed the most recent invoice from EPS regarding the

ILIDs. Steve Riley will clarify the required payment for the 4th ILID which has not been installed because of the anticipated Hwy D renovation that has not started.

Report from Lake Owen Association:

Steve Riley attended the Lake Owen Association meeting. Mr. Mike Gardner from the Sigurd Olson Institute was there and has entered into an agreement with the Lake Owen Association to provide services. The Board and membership discussed options to work in the future with the Institute and anticipate contacting them after the FOTH projects are completed.

Volunteer Appreciation Dinner:

A dinner to recognize the volunteers will be held on October 9 at the Namakagon Town Hall. Linda Fischer and Julia Campbell will coordinate the event. Denise Dupras will work on the initiations and will get a list to them. The volunteer and a spouse will be invited. RSVP will be required.

The domain name is due for a renewal, Denise Dupras will take care of this. After discussion she will also look for options for a new web-designer.

New Business:

Meeting Schedule – The next meeting will be Dec 4, 2010. Additional meetings will be held in 2011 on February 19th, April 16th, May 21st, June 25th and the Annual meeting August 20th. Fun on the Water will be held on July 23, 2011. The meeting in May will be held at Grand View.

State of the Lake Presentation – Phil Rasmussen recommended that we work with the Sigurd Olson Institute to develop a report on the "State of the Lake", that would be presented at the annual meeting each year.
